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Champaign County Engineer 2016 Annual Report



It is with great pleasure to present the work of the Champaign County Engineer's office. Whether we are keeping the roads safe during the winter season, resurfacing or repairing deteriorated roads, replacing bridges or culverts, or working on the right of way, the employees are very dedicated and hard working. Most of our man hours in 2016 were **dedicated to the maintenance** of 239 miles of roadway and the upkeep of the right of way in the form of resurfacing, mowing, snow and ice control, ditch cleaning, trash pickup, tree cutting and road repair. **The 2015-2016 winter was the second mildest in the last 10 years.** We used about 35% of the salt we would in a typical year. This reduced amount was also due to the use of a salt enhancer called Beet Heet®. Adding this product makes the salt more effective at temperatures below 25 F. We had many days with single digit temperatures. With this added product, we were able to melt more ice and snow providing safer roads faster than without. A great deal of thanks is given to the employees for making 2016 a successful year. Some of our accomplishments completed this year can be found in the following report.

Funding for our office to accomplish our work comes from three main sources. The portion of the 28 cents per gallon state gas tax that goes to each county only calculates to 3.2 cents per gallon. This fixed amount is based on the number of gallons sold in Ohio and generated about \$2,356,000 in 2016 for Champaign County. The fluctuating price of fuel does not change the amount we receive and this number has been stagnate if not decreasing for the past 7 years. The second funding source comes from a license plate fee which is divided between several government entities. The Engineer's office last year received just over \$1,326,000. The third main source of revenue is also based on the number of licenses issued in Champaign County referred to as the Permissive License Fee. This additional \$15.00 fee is split between municipalities, townships and the county depending on where you live. The County portion was about \$585,000 last year. The permissive fee was increased in 2015 and is helping overcome the material and construction cost increases over the last 20 years. Champaign County has less funding than more populated counties to pave our roads due to the limited number of license plates issued. With this funding challenge, our office has applied for additional State and Federal grants to assist in overcoming the 30 to 40% increase in material cost over the recent years. No property tax or sales tax is used in maintaining roads or replacing bridges in Champaign County

In accordance with the Ohio Revised Code, an annual report must be made to the County Commissioners summarizing the work performed and the condition of the County infrastructure. 2016 Road Work

Current road centerline mileage for the County totals 239.26 miles. This mileage is certified and provided to the Ohio Department of Transportation.

2016 Paving Project

In 2016, we were able to reconstruct and pave 4.18 miles of Millerstown-Eris Road. Phenix Stabilization, LLC performed the cement base stabilization and A&B Asphalt paved the road.

Mowing

We made 3 single passes and 3 full width passes of mowing this year totaling 2,896 lane miles of mowing. Total cost for mowing was \$67,556.71.

Pavement Marking

153.32 Miles of Road were marked with centerline and edge line. 12 railroad crossings, 2 cross walks and 6 school zones were also painted for a total project cost of \$175,712.32.

Crack Sealing

Last year we crack sealed Mt. Tabor, Parkview, Dallas, Ludlow, Stevenson, and Ward roads. We were also able to crack seal Clark road and Ludlow for Salem and Union townships The total mileage of crack sealing was 21.6 miles.

Road Profile and Crown Correction

Various locations on Urbana Woodstock Pike, Kennard Kingscreek Road, Perry Road, Mutual Catawba Roads were milled and graded to help improve the ride quality and correct drainage issues.

2016 Road Reconstruction

In 2016, we were able to reconstruct and pave a 700ft section of Mutual-Catawba Road commonly referred to as "Walker Hill". Phenix Stabilization, LLC performed the reconstruction and cement stabilization while A&B Asphalt paved the road.

Construction Cost: \$113,802.68

Snow and Ice Control

1,006 tons of salt were used to treat county and township roads through the 2015-2016 winter season. Our average over the last ten years has been just over 2000 ton per year. Nearly 70% was used for county roads and the remaining 30% was purchased by townships and smaller incorporated villages. This was our second lowest total in the last 10 years.

The 2016 winter salt price was \$54.90 per ton. This was down from 2015's price of \$70.05 per ton because of the mild winter in 2015. We also started using Beet Heet to help the salt melt snow and ice at lower temperatures and not refreeze. Using this product has helped reduce the amount of material required to melt the same amount of snow and ice at temperatures below 25° F.

2016 Bridge and Culvert Work

Our annual inspection of 211 bridges has been completed and shows that overall, our bridges are in good shape. We share maintenance responsibilities with Clark County with three bridges on County Line Road and two bridges with Logan County.

2016 Culverts Replaced

Per Ohio Law any structure with a span less than 10' is considered a culvert.

The engineer's office replaced 41 structures, of which, 5 were 30" or larger and 36 were between 12"-27" diameters. The largest culvert replaced was 64 linear feet of an 8' x 4' concrete box structure on Zimmerman road.

No bridges have load restrictions. One bridge is posted one lane (18' or less) and six are posted narrow (18' to 20').

Mapping and Planning

Our Office of Mapping and Planning continues to do a great job serving the public. The office answers a number of questions daily from the public in addition to their normal duties. The number of conveyances and new surveys were up about 10%, but the number of sheriff sales were almost half as last year giving a total of 1751 Conveyances reviewed.

Existing Fleet

The total miles driven by the 33 licensed vehicles was 291,171 miles last year. The 21 pieces of off road construction equipment totaled 5232 hours of usage. We have 11 tandem trucks. The average age of our tandems is 6 years old with an average of 79,958 miles. Through 2016 we spent almost \$90,000 on fuel. The total maintenance cost for the entire fleet and construction equipment was over \$83,000 for this year.
